1. CALL TO ORDER

The Torrance Parks and Recreation Commission convened in regular session at 6:32 p.m. on Wednesday, January 14, 2026, at the West Annex Commission meeting room, Torrance City Hall.

The pledge of Allegiance was led by Commissioner Wright.

3. REPORT ON THE POSTING OF THE AGENDA

Community Services Director La Rock stated that the revised agenda for the Torrance Parks and Recreation Commission was posted on the Public Notice Board and the City's website on Wednesday, January 8, 2026.

Management Aide Brent Abelson introduced himself to the Commission.

6. CONSENT CALENDAR

6A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: December 10, 2025

MOTION: Commissioner Craft moved to approve the minutes of December 10, 2025, Commissioner Mayfield seconded the motion; a roll call vote reflected a vote of 5-0, with Commissioners Hoover and Muhammed absent.

MOTION: Commissioner Wright moved to approve the excused absence of Commissioner Hoover, Commissioner Mayfield seconded the motion; a roll call vote reflected a vote of 5-0, with Commissioners Hoover and Muhammed absent. The motion passed.

7. ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

7A. COMMUNITY SERVICES DIRECTOR – RECEIVE AND FILE COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT UPDATES

Community Services Director Stevens introduced himself to the Commission and discussed his prior positions.

Community Services Director Stevens noted that staff would begin work on the public outreach plan for the proposed renaming of Columbia Park and would bring the recommendations to the February Commission meeting.

Community Services Director Stevens stated that the Torrance American Baseball (TABB) would have their opening day on February 28, 2026 and noted that the flyer was included in the agenda.

Capital Projects Updates:

- The pickleball courts at Wilson Park had received their final approval.
- Columbia Park WWII Monument construction documents have been submitted for plan check approval.
- Guenser Park walking path replacement construction documents have been submitted for plan check approval.
- LED lighting upgrades at Wilson Park tennis courts were to be completed by the end of the month.

MOTION: Commissioner Mayfield moved to receive and file 7A - Community Services Department Updates. Commissioner Wright seconded the motion; a roll call vote reflected a vote of 5-0, with Commissioners Hoover and Muhammed absent. The motion passed.

7B. COMMUNITY SERVICES DIRECTOR - ACCEPT AND FILE PROGRAMMING DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORTS

Administrative Services

Park Ranger Supervisor Arevalo discussed Parks' usage and permit conflicts due to the time change and noted that rangers were still finding nitrous oxide containers in the parks. He presented the coyote report and noted that due to possible errors in the pet licensing report, he would present a corrected report next month.

Park Services

Park Services Manager Stanojevic presented the report for December by districts and discussed work in the parks by staff or volunteers for fence repair, eliminating e-bike dirt mounds, landscaping, installation of ADA swings, equipment restoration and dedication bench installations. He noted that the Friends of Madrona Marsh had offered a volunteer celebration luncheon to thank volunteers and listed the Marsh programs offered to Torrance schools and discussed volunteer efforts to restore habitat at the Marsh and West Basin.

Senior Business Manager Covarrubias highlighted programs at the Farmer's Market for the month of December and noted visits from Santa and Elves. She reviewed the types of produce available in December and the revenue for December 2025 compared to December 2024.

Recreation Services

Recreation Services Manager Craig presented the Recreation Services Monthly Report for December 2025, included in the material of record. He noted that the bookings for picnic areas reservations was up 40% from last year's total, due to a new online platform that allowed for

individuals to book their own reservations. He discussed the inaugural polar plunge event that had had 125 participants and noted that youth basketball would officially start on Saturday, January 17 with 1040 participants and 104 volunteer coaches. He announced that Supervisor Jake Castillo had been confirmed President of the Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation Board (SCMAF). He highlighted Frost Fest, the winter camp program which sold out with 90 participants on each day and discussed the Annual Snow Day on December 13 with over 6500 participants.

MOTION: Commissioner Wright moved to accept and file the monthly staff reports. Commissioner Craft seconded the motion; a roll call vote reflected a vote of 5-0, with Commissioners Hoover and Muhammed absent. The motion passed.

8. COMMISSION ORAL COMMUNICATIONS

The Commission discussed the Rose Float visit and requested that past elected officials be invited to attend the float viewing to increase attendance.

Commissioner Craft requested an excused absence for the February 11 meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

Recommendation of the Community Services Director that the Parks and Recreation Commission accept and approve the community outreach plan for the possible renaming of Columbia Park to Ted T. Tanouye Park.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

On June 17, 2008, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2008-81, which authorized the City Council Ad Hoc Naming of Public Facilities Committee to establish policies and procedures for naming City-Owned properties, including land, buildings, and facilities. The item aims to guide the City Council in considering the following potential renaming of Columbia Park to honor Ted T. Tanouye.

On April 7, 2025, City Manager's Office staff submitted a Naming Facilities Application on behalf of Councilmember Jon Kaji. The application requested City Council's consideration to rename Columbia Park to Ted T. Tanouye Park, in honor of Torrance's only Congressional Medal of Honor recipient. Mayor George Chen appointed an Ad-Hoc Naming Committee comprised of Councilmembers Kaji, Mattucci and Sheikh. The Ad-Hoc Committee considered the matter on September 2, 2025, and forwarded a recommendation to rename Columbia Park to honor Mr. Tanouye to the full City Council.

On October 7, 2025, the City Council reviewed the Committee's recommendation, and a majority vote remanded the matter to the Parks & Recreation Commission in order seek further input from commissioners and members of the public.

The Parks and Recreation Commission considered the item at their meeting of November 12, 2025. The Commission's recommendation to City Council was to defer any action to rename the park in favor of additional community education and outreach. The City Council, at their meeting on December 2, 2025, discussed the item and referred the item back to the Parks and Recreation Commission.

The Parks and Recreation Commission considered/discussed the item at their meeting on December 10, 2025. The Commission discussed the best way to conduct public outreach to best inform the public of the proposed renaming of the park.

Councilmember Dr. Jeremy Gerson addressed the Columbia Park renaming at the January 13, 2026, City Council meeting. The Councilmember proposed an alternative Ted Tanouye Park to be established at the Ted T. Tanouye Memorial and include an adjacent strip of land on the

opposite side of Carson Street. This proposal is to be considered by the Commission and Council and will be included in the community outreach plan as an alternative to renaming Columbia Park.

Community Outreach Strategy

Tonight's item is to seek approval from the Commission on the community outreach plan. Based on recent community engagement efforts, outreach to the community may include, but not be limited to, the following:

- Creating a landing page providing information about the history of Columbia Park, Ted T. Tanouye and the two park proposals
- A survey to gather public input on the park proposals
- A QR code providing access to the landing page/survey
- Citywide outreach events, will include but not be limited to, the Cherry Blossom Festival, Armed Forces Day Parade, July 4th celebration and the Summer Concert Series
- City social media outreach campaign managed by the Communications Division

The public outreach campaign will begin with the Cherry Blossom Festival and will continue through the end of the Summer Concert Series. Upon completion, the Recreation Services Division will have obtained sufficient feedback to share findings with the Parks and Recreation Commission and ultimately with the City Council.

1. Rename Columbia Park to Ted T. Tanouye Park (Original proposal)
2. Keep Columbia Park as is and create Ted T. Tanouye Park in area around his existing monument (Councilman Dr. Gerson's proposal)
3. Neither option, keep everything as is

Option 1: Rename Columbia Park to Ted T. Tanouye Park

On April 7, 2025, the City Manager's Office staff submitted a Naming Facilities Application on behalf of Councilmember Jon Kaji. The application requested City Council's consideration to rename Columbia Park to Ted T. Tanouye Park. The Ad Hoc Naming of Public Facilities Committee met on Tuesday September 2, 2025. The Committee voted 3-0 for the item to be brought to council for further considerations. The item to rename Columbia Park was introduced at the October 7, 2025 City Council meeting, where the City Council voted to defer the item to the Parks and Recreation Commission for further comment and discussion. At the November 12, 2025 Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, the Commission voted unanimously (6-0) to recommend further research and increase community outreach.

Staff did not identify any conditions in Resolution 68-164 which would prevent the City from renaming Columbia Park.

Estimated Project Cost \$20,000 - \$55,000

Option 2: Create Ted T. Tanouye Park in an alternative location

This was proposed by Councilmember Dr. Gerson at the January 13, 2025 City Council meeting, as an option for consideration.

This option would establish a new park titled, “Ted T. Tanouye Memorial Park”

The triangle featuring the Ted T. Tanouye Memorial would be combined with the identical triangle on the north side of Carson Street. This would become Ted T. Tanouye Memorial Park.



The section of El Prado Avenue that runs between Torrance High School and the existing memorial, would be renamed Ted T. Tanouye Memorial Drive. This means that the park address would be on Ted T. Tanouye Memorial Drive. The section of Manuel Avenue at the southwest end of El Prado park, that runs between the park and the triangle would be renamed to Go for Broke Way. This would honor Ted’s Army unit, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team (RCT).

Part B.2: Street Renamings

Ted T. Tanouye

Ted T. Tanouye was born on November 14, 1919 in Torrance. He was a lifelong resident of Torrance, and part of Torrance High School's graduating class of 1938. Despite the passage of Executive Order 9066, which incarcerated Japanese Americans, Tanouye enlisted in the U.S. Army in February 1942. On July 7, 1944, he was wounded in action at Hill 140. After receiving medical attention, Ted was back in the field and wounded again two months later. He died of his wounds after five days and was honored with the Distinguished Service Cross. This honor was later upgraded to the Medal of Honor on June 21, 2000, during a ceremony held at the White House, where President Bill Clinton honored 22 Japanese American veterans of World War II, primarily from the 442nd Regimental Combat Team.

Additionally, Tanouye was awarded the Congressional Gold Medal on October 5, 2010, following Public Law 111-254, signed by President Barack Obama, which granted the 100th Infantry Battalion, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, and the Military Intelligence Service the Congressional Gold Medal.

Existing Ted Tanouye Recognition

Currently, Ted Tanouye is honored at the Ted T. Tanouye Memorial located at 220 W. Carson Street, Torrance, CA 90501, near Torrance High School.

Additionally, the National Guard Armory at 2505 Cabrillo Avenue, Torrance, CA 90501, was renamed the Ted Tanouye National Armory on May 19, 2002. Mr. Tanouye is also honored on the Veterans Memorial Wall in front of City Hall at the corner of Torrance Boulevard and Maple Avenue.

Go For Broke

Even before the start of World War II, thousands of Japanese American patriots had enlisted in the United States Army and the Hawaii Territorial Guard. On February 1, 1943, the War Department reclassified Nisei men, ending their status as enemy aliens, making them eligible for the draft. That day, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team was formed. The War Department called for 4,000 volunteers for the 442nd RCT, and over 10,000 enlisted.

On April 22, 1944, the 442nd RCT departed for Europe and saw their first action at the Anzio beachhead on June 6, 1944. The 442nd RCT played a pivotal role in liberating Rome, liberating French prisoners of war at Moribach and liberating holocaust survivors at Dachau. After VE Day, members of the 442nd volunteered to serve in the Pacific to defeat the Japanese. The 442nd RCT had a motto of "Go For Broke", a Hawaiian phrase for giving it your all, and became known as the Go For Broke Regiment.

History of Columbia Park

In June 1968, Columbia Broadcasting System, Inc. donated 17.2 acres of land to the City of Torrance, to be used for physical activity and recreation. This was the largest single public land donation in the history of the City. On July 23, 1968 the City Council passed a unanimous resolution (Resolution No. 68-164) to name this land, Columbia Park.

Columbia Park was not fully realized until 1978, but it remains the largest and one of the most utilized parks in Torrance. The park continues to be the home of the KNX radio tower, originally installed by Columbia Broadcasting. The park features a thriving community garden program beginning with 52 plots in January 1975 and has expanded to 125 individual plots. Columbia Park features 4 lighted soccer fields, regularly used by AYSO. The 1.33 mile exercise path is very popular with local residents.

In April 2025, the Torrance City Council approved the construction of a World War II Camp Wall Monument at Columbia Park. This wall will honor the 125,000 unjustly incarcerated Japanese Americans. Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi secured a \$5 million state grant to educate the public on mass incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II.

RECOMMENDATION

Recommendation of the Community Services Director that the Parks and Recreation Commission approve the revised El Nido Park redevelopment conceptual plan.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

At the regular meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission on September 10, 2025, the Commission provided input regarding the community outreach for the redevelopment and conceptual design for El Nido Park. During that meeting staff informed the commission the City would conduct public outreach to receive feedback from stakeholders and interested parties regarding the conceptual design of El Nido Park.

Public Outreach

The City has conducted community outreach and initiated broader neighborhood outreach to gather input from key user groups, local residents, and the broader community to ensure that the project reflects shared priorities related to access, amenities, and safety. All outreach comments were shared with the design firm to be considered for the final design plan.

Outreach activities included:

- North Torrance Little League Board Meeting
Monday, October 7, 2024
Fact-finding meeting focused on needs related to fields, safety, circulation, and scheduling.
Non-public; direct notice to stakeholders
- City Council Meeting
Tuesday, June 17, 2025
City Council authorized community engagement and advancement of the project to the Parks and Recreation Commission.
Agenda posted, City newsletter, Torrance Alerts, and social media (Facebook, Instagram, YouTube).
- North Torrance Little League Follow-Up Meeting
Tuesday, August 26, 2025
Ongoing dialogue on project impacts and scheduling coordination.
- *Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting
Wednesday, September 10, 2025
Presentation of the El Nido Park Revitalization Project Concept. Commission noted ongoing outreach and received oral comments and 10 public handouts supporting retention of the RC track.
Agenda posted, City newsletter, Torrance Alerts, and social media.

- Public Community Meeting
Saturday, September 20, 2025 - El Nido Park
Gather residents in a 500-1,000-ft radius. Input on access, parking, lighting, and amenities. Signage posted 14 days in advance and social media promotion.
- North Torrance Homeowners' Association Meeting
Thursday, October 9, 2025
Discussion focused on access, parking, lighting, RC track considerations, and amenity trade-offs.
Distributed by North Torrance Homeowners Association to District 3 residents.

How Public Input has Impacted the Conceptual Plan


These comprehensive outreach activities actively informed decisions regarding the overall design plan including site access, parking, phasing and amenity selection. The Community input was provided to the design firm and continues to shape project development as it advances toward Commission recommendation, and City Council approval. Input received through these efforts prompted updates to the redevelopment plan. They are:

- Traffic and Access: Staff evaluated relocating park access away from Kingsdale Avenue to reduce neighborhood traffic impacts and improve safety.
- Parking Capacity: The concept was revised to substantially expand on-site parking to accommodate peak league use and minimize spillover into adjacent streets.
- Amenity Mix: To broaden community benefit, staff are evaluating complementary amenities such as pickleball, tennis, and cricket facilities alongside youth baseball.
- Phasing Strategy: To maintain continuity for youth sports, the initial project phase prioritizes ballfields, parking, and core park infrastructure, while supplemental amenities advance through detailed design.

**At the 9/10/25 Commission meeting, community members expressed strong support for retaining the existing RC track at El Nido Park. The Commission received 10 public handouts and multiple oral comments, which are being considered alongside other program elements as concept updates are refined.*

Staff recommend that the Commission provide input regarding the revised conceptual design and approve the overall design concept. Following the Commission's input, staff will begin the process of contracting with a firm to finalize the design and create the construction documents.

During the month of January, the Ranger Unit maintained a consistent deployment schedule, not including holidays.



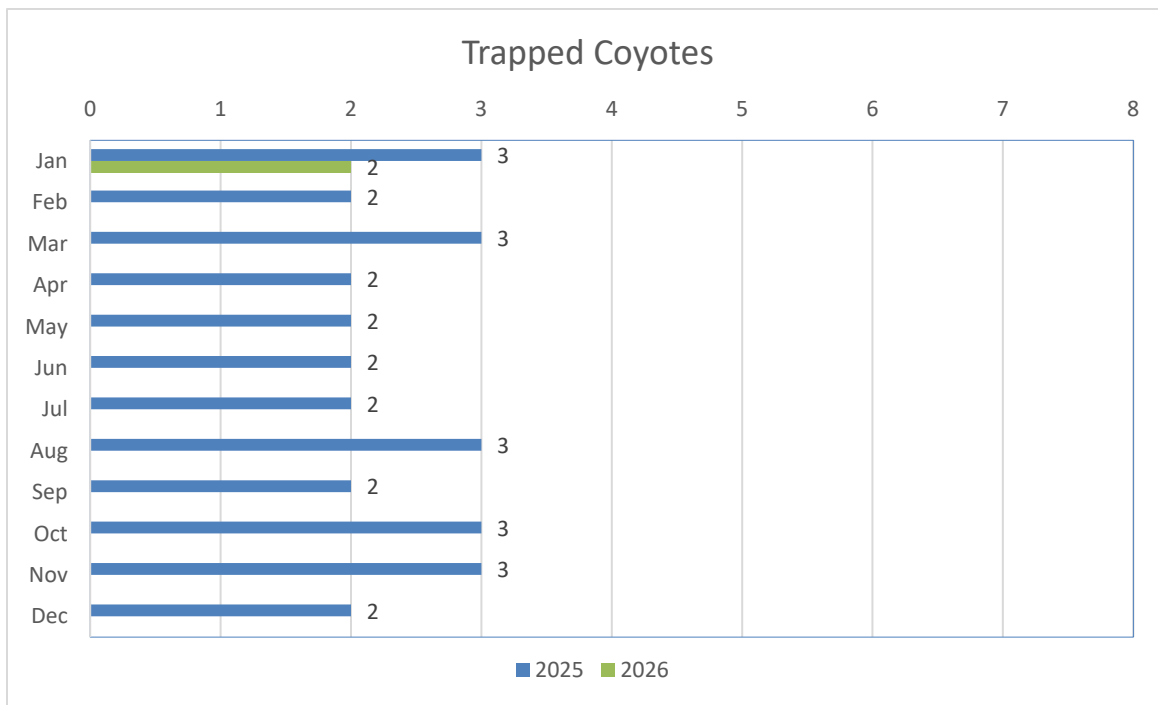
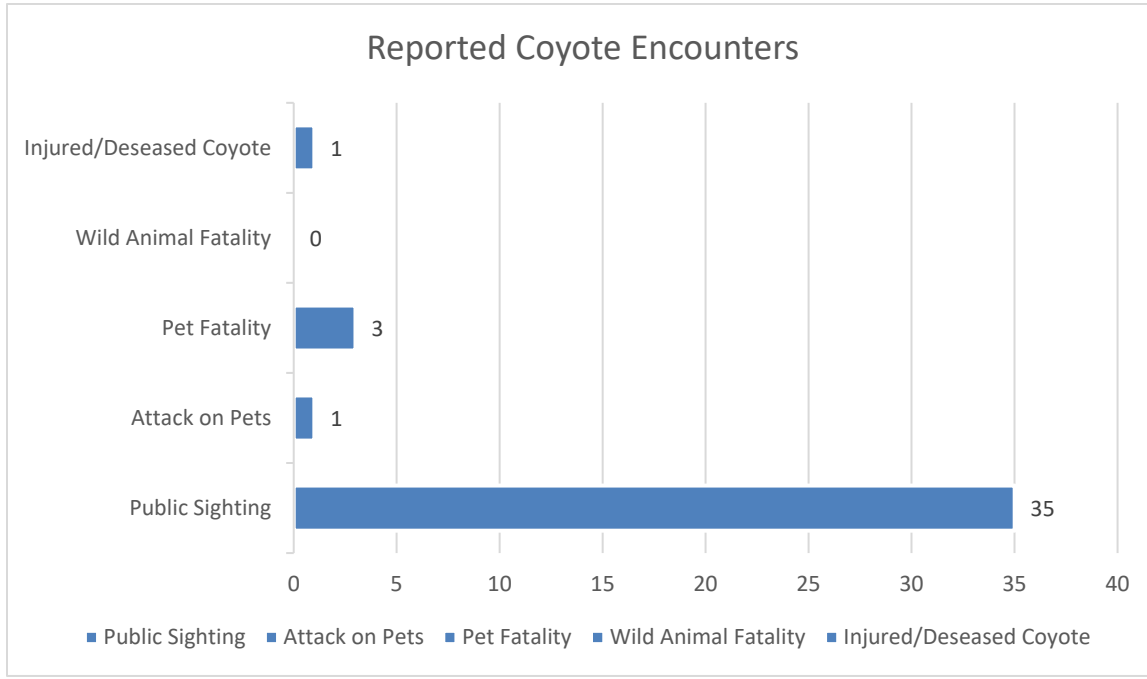

The City's pet licensing program with DocuPet continues servicing Torrance residents.

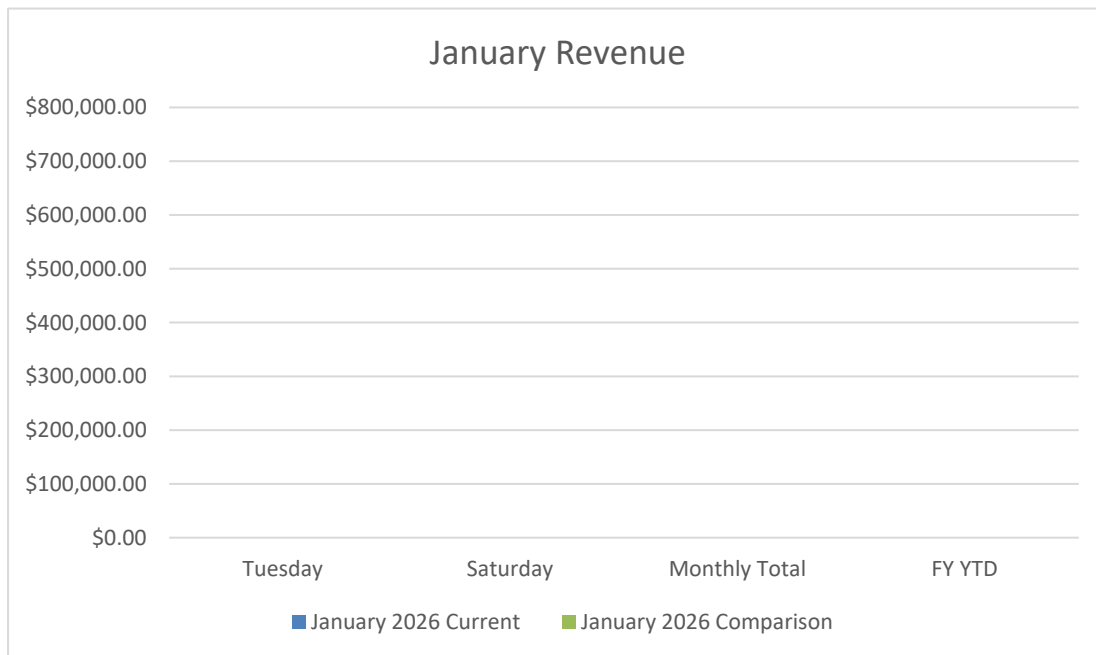

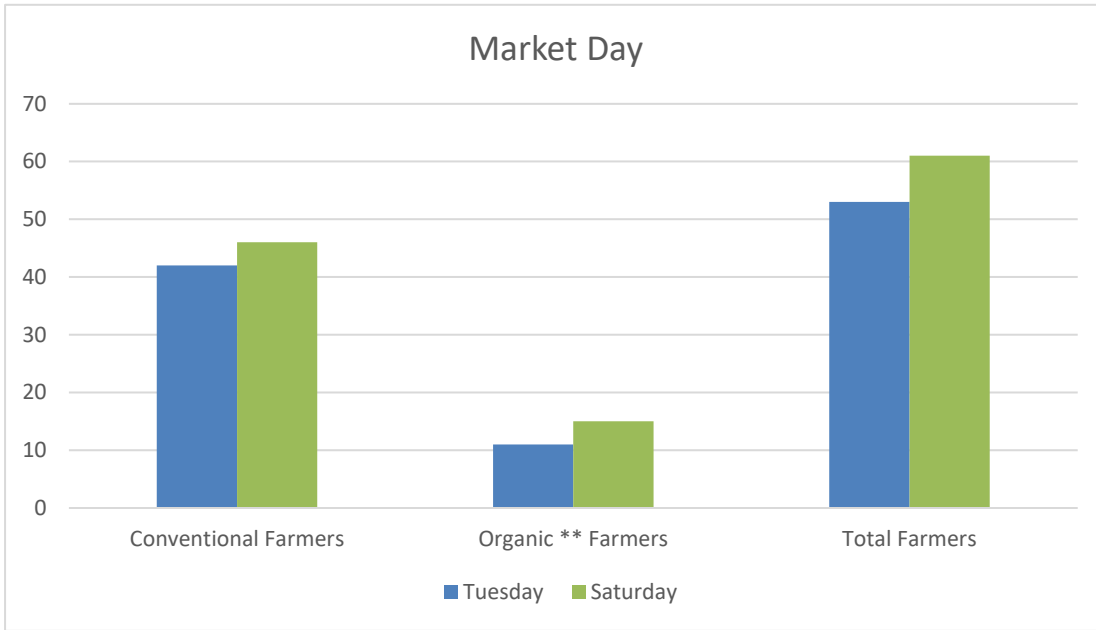

FARMER'S MARKET PROGRAM – Joyce Chan, Farmer's Market Manager

The Torrance Certified Farmers Market welcomed three new vendors to the market community: a spirulina farmer, an onigiri food vendor, and a dessert vendor, enhancing the diversity of offerings available to visitors.

The market remains abundant with seasonally rich produce. Winter citrus is plentiful and diverse; cara cara oranges, daisy and kishu tangerines, pomelos, grapefruits, and navel oranges. Farmers also bring in exceptionally beautiful brassicas; green broccoli and cauliflower in green, purple, bright yellow, and white varieties.





***Certified Organic Farmers require additional permits, soil tests, additional 3rd party organic registration, etc. Additional permitting can be quite costly for small family farmers. Thus, some farmers who do not use pesticides may not identify as a "Certified Organic Farmer," because of the high costs involved.*

COMMUNITY GARDENS PROGRAM – Joyce Chan, Farmer’s Market Manager

Community Gardens is looking into plot expansions and weed abatement. Due to the rainy season, weeds continue to be an issue.

Online registration for gardeners has been confirmed by staff. We are improving the registration process so that it’s easier for gardeners and City staff.

HIGHLIGHTS OF PROJECTS COMPLETED BY DISTRICT

District 1 – Descanso, Guenser, La Carretera, Mc Master, Osage

- Descanso Park - A decaying tree was removed as well as a rotted wood post replacement along the DG walking path.
- Mc Master Park - Two large holes filled along the north parkway, and a large overgrown bush has removed at the east driveway entrance.

District 2 – Entradero, La Romeria, Paradise, Sunnyglen, Victor

- Entradero Park - Ongoing landscaping project including the removal of current landscape and replacement with drought tolerant and low maintenance gardens. Tree removals were performed due to structural and safety issues.
- La Romeria Park - Large tree trunk removed.
- Paradise Park – Playground wing repair completed

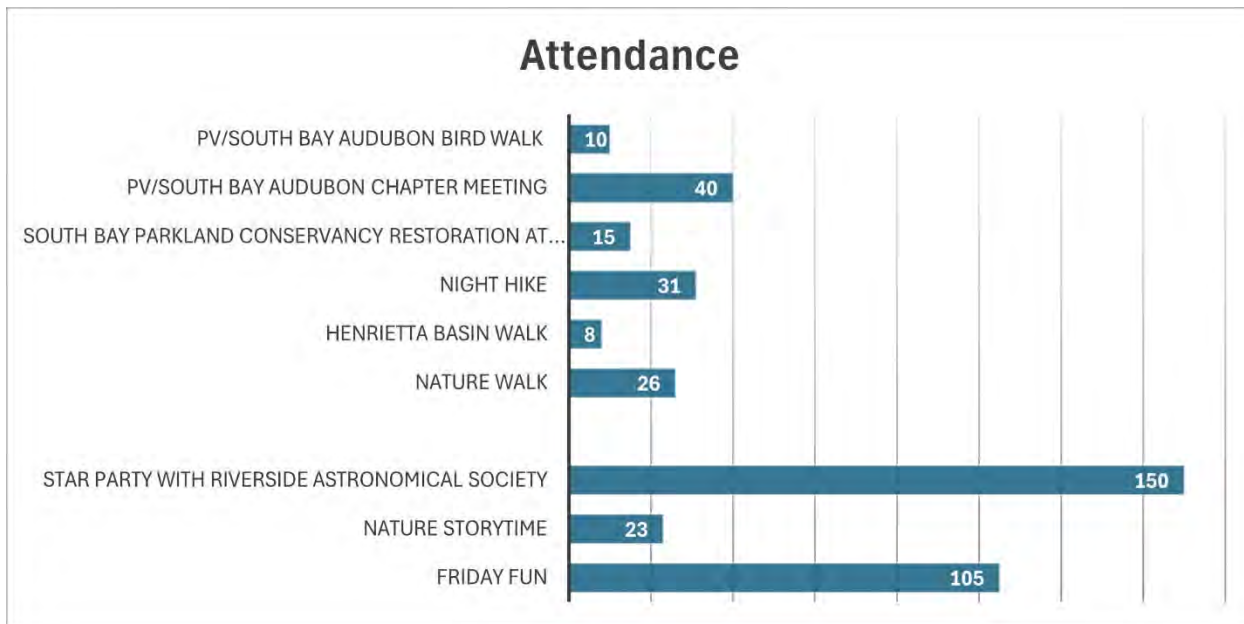



- January attendance remained steady despite cooler weather. Staff successfully maintained daily operations while supporting the start of swim lessons, recreational swim and private aquatic programming.
- Planning for summer programming is currently underway with programming and events confirmed.

Youth Sports:

- Winter Basketball started at the beginning of January and will continue through early March. Registration is very full with 1063 participants.
- Youth Sports staff participated in two official trainings before the season started.
- Games are held at Magruder, Madrona and J.H. Hull Middle Schools. Practices and games are also held at the Dee Hardison Sports Center at Wilson Park.




